




ART DIRECTOR STATEMENT

Art in the Loop welcomed 24 artists and collectives to participate in the 2019 Art in the Loop Project: *Make/Believe*. Through a competitive, open call process, a panel selected local artists to create site-specific, temporary artwork and local musicians to perform concerts for our *KC Streetcar Summer Sounds Music Series*. Artwork was installed or took place in three locations Downtown: along the KC Streetcar route and onboard vehicles, in Washington Square Park and at the Kansas City Public Library's Central Library.

Art in the Loop asked for projects that could transform reality; for artwork that created a shared fantasy for downtown visitors. viewers with the opportunity to imagine, to make-believe, for a moment during each day.





Macrocosmos Caterpillar: Monarch Streetcar

The Monarch Streetcar, also known as Mervin, was a well received new resident of Downtown Kansas City.

An endearing persona, this giant caterpillar crawled around Downtown

serving commuters, residents and visitors. Mervin's global message is far more important however, a reminder of Kansas City's importance along the monarch butterfly migration route to the Oyamel Fir Forests of Central Mexico. Within a rapidly developing urban environment green spaces, especially those that have plants butterflies need during their pit-stops, are dwindling. Miniature prairies were created in planters along the streetcar route chock full of these necessary plants. Mervin, as you saw him wriggle by, reminded us of the importance these plants have on the butterfly's journey.










Herons and Hummingbirds Cross the Road


KC Streetcar Kauffman Center Stop


public²

KC Streetcar Library, River Market West and Union Station Stops

Mixed media dance performance

public² was a mixed reality, geolocated performance which took place at three KC Streetcar stops. A site-specific, virtual reality dance was performed and recorded at each stop, and was then accessible online with a mobile

device. Each performance tapped into the idea of public space, documenting the architectural and historic context of the city while also creating and becoming new pieces of history. Through this process, a constant cultural recycling that enriched public space, history blended with society, informing and being informed by one another. A culminating live performance brought the dance full circle. Participating dancers included Katrina Warren, Leo Gayden and Tristian Griffin.







Abuela was a public performance that brought a life-sized puppet on board the KC Streetcar. She is an elderly, indigenous grandmother from the Andes mountains who speaks with her eyes, expressive face, and body language. She brought an antique radio that played her favorite songs in Quechua, her native language. Abuela

enriched the lives of all the people she interacted with, at once filling them with joy and gifting them the knowledge of her culture. Words were not needed for *Abuela* to fully express the love she felt and the curiosity she experienced when interacting with new and friendly faces.

Hall delivered a riveting spoken-word performance with story-telling, facts, and updated remixes to the original soundtracks. Her focus was on Charlie, who is all of us at one point or another. A Golden Ticket is just a blessing - at some point all of us will get one. We will have the opportunity to watch others and learn from their mistakes. In the end we may not even deserve our blessing, but because of our character - our spirit - our persistent nature, we still receive. Hall was joined by local poets Tiara Nicole, Angela Roux and Serenity.

Tact

Washington Square Park

Cotton, satin, silk, nylon, brass, steel, and plastic

Tact was a large scale interactive installation that invited viewers to focus on community interaction, prayer ritual, and sacred space. Tact was a representation of all of these ideas; an enclosed area around a group of redbud trees and chain-link fencing referenced sacred sites seen along American highways. The fence invited viewers to attach items of symbolic significance to it, creating a community collage of history and culture. By installing Tact in Washington Square Park, a place that has had a history of public engagement and organized gatherings, the idea of sacred space and ritual was compounded. This work understands spaces like these should be approached with thoughtfulness and sensitivity. The name "Tact" is a nod to this understanding, the definition meaning adroitness and understanding when dealing with difficult situations.




















JOHN HACHMEISTER

We Remember/We Forget Washington Square Park

Steel, sand bonded with an organic binder, and paper

A monument of sand collected from the Kaw River in Northeastern Kansas, this artwork showed the transience of memory through the process of erosion, slowly washing away the outer sand structure to reveal an inner artwork of steel fabricated books. The sand carried the memories of long-ago mountains that have also been reduced to sand. We see through this process the juxtaposition of sand and steel; on the one hand, objects that are preserved only in the memories of those who have seen them and on the other, objects that are less mutable than memory.

Washington Square Park

Stainless steel and concrete

An immersive and interactive experience where several freestanding reflective steel planks have been erected, *Endless* invited attention towards both the city skyline and the natural landscape of the park into and around the space of the viewer. The perceptions allowed the viewer to alter their own experience of the space that they inhabit, stepping into a world where nature, individual, and city coexist perfectly.

INTER RELATION>SHIP was a live performance that captivated an audience in Washington Square Park. The audience was asked to participate by tying strings to an alter, infusing it with the gratitude and joy the audience experienced throughout the performance.


Electronic music performance

Trans/Portal was a pop-up electronic music and dance

performance in Washington Square Park highlighting the musical and artistic talents of LGBTQ+ artists. A culmination of a variety of electronic music performances that ranged from avante garde electronic art performance work to chill-pop and indie infused music. Aided by augmented reality accessed through Snapchat (the event had its own filter), the music

captured audience attention and transported viewers and listeners into a different world; a magical and fantastic place of radical self expression, personal liberation, and raw beauty of art and music. Trans/Portal created a public facing, community-minded space where members of the queer and transgender communities could flex their artistic ability.
